Chairman Zimmer called the March 11, 2015 meeting of the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) to order at 10:04 a.m. The first order of business was to review the Minutes from the December 10, 2014 Meeting. *A motion to approve the minutes as submitted was made by Commissioner Darr. Commissioner Tennis seconded the motion and the minutes were approved by unanimous vote.*

The next item on the agenda was the Chairman's Report. Chairman Zimmer introduced several new members of the Commission: Superior Court Judge Mary Jane Bowes, Representative Joseph Petrarca, Edward Michalik, and Christine Wechsler Rayer. Chairman Zimmer offered his congratulations to Commissioner Tennis on his reappointment as Secretary of the Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs (DDAP) and welcomed Carolyn DeLaurentis as PCCD's new Acting Chief Counsel. Chairman Zimmer then had the sad duty to inform those who were not already aware that former PCCD Chairman Walter Phillips passed away on February 6. Commissioner Lloyd White, Chairman of the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole (PBPP), recently passed away as well. Next, Chairman Zimmer said PCCD's federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) allocation increased from \$17 million to between \$65 and \$75 million for 2015. The final amount will be released in May 2015. Additionally, the Endowment Act has been enacted and \$48 million is now available from the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) penalty funds through the Children's Advocacy Center Advisory Committee (CACAC).

Next on the agenda was the Executive Director's Report. Linda Rosenberg offered an update on PCCD's federal and state funding. President Obama's proposed FY 2016 budget was released with several changes from FY 2015. A small cut of four percent is proposed to the Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) funding, mainly due to more earmarking, which will result in a cut of about \$300,000 to PCCD. The President recommended lowering the cap on VOCA funding to \$1 billion in FY 2016 which is a significant decrease from this year's \$2.3 billion. The Juvenile Accountability Block Grant (JABG) was zeroed out last year, but the President proposed it at \$30 million for FY 2016, and Juvenile Title II formula grants are proposed to increase from \$56 million to \$70 million. Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) program funds which are administered by the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee (CJAC) are proposed to increase from \$10 million to \$14 million. National Criminal History Improvement Program (NCHIP) funding is proposed to decrease by \$20 million and Coverdell funding is proposed to be eliminated. In the President's budget Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI) dollars would increase from \$28 million to \$45 million, Second Chance Act funds would go up from \$68 million to \$75 million, Drug Court funding would go down a little, and there are a few new programs including one to fund body cameras for law enforcement and another called Smart on Juvenile Justice. PCCD has been aggressive in going after some competitive federal funding opportunities. One application, for up to \$1.7 million, would fund a pretrial diversion project which would be tied into Pennsylvania's JRI efforts. PCCD also partnered with the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections (DOC), PBPP and county probation to apply for a Smart Supervision grant for up to \$750,000. PCCD also partnered with several other agencies to go after a Second Chance Act reentry opportunity for \$600,000.

In Governor Wolf's proposed budget, PCCD is basically level funded with just a few changes. The General Government Operating Budget (GGOB) is approximately \$4 million. A Problem-Solving Courts appropriation of \$300,000 was included. The Intermediate Punishment (IP) program received \$18.1 million. The Violence Prevention Program (VPP) is level funded at \$3.8 million. The Victims of

Juvenile Offenders (VOJO) line is level funded at \$1.3 million. Last year \$2 million was in the budget for Child Advocacy Centers (CACs), but this year funding will come from increased fees on birth certificates legislated through Congress at an estimated amount of \$2 million. Funding for the Office of the Safe School Advocate for the School District of Philadelphia was moved to the Department of Education. Most of the \$1 million in JRI savings from the reduction in population at the DOC will go to support victims' service programs with the remainder going to probation and innovative policing. The Endowment Act, as already noted by Chairman Zimmer, places the responsibility to administer NCAA dollars. RASA Funds, which support Victim/Witness Services have been decreasing every year since 2008, and are now at \$5.9 million. Crime Victim payments are down, Constables are level funded, Deputy Sheriffs funding is down a little, and Substance Abuse, Education and Demand Reduction (SAEDR) has been level funded at \$3.5 million. Ms. Rosenberg said staff has been busy releasing funding announcements to give the grantees ample time to submit applications for a July 1 start date.

Ms. Rosenberg asked Commissioners Tennis and Marion to provide an update on funding for DDAP and the Department of Human Services (DHS), Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS). Commissioner Tennis said DDAP funding has gone down by around \$11 million over the last few years, and the \$5 million increase proposed for next year will be a step toward bringing the funding level back to where it once was. The Department's focus is on trying to have the greatest impact on the overdose crisis. A competitive grant process will be put in place for Single County Authorities (SCAs) with a focus on people who will end up in the criminal justice system or those who are most likely to overdose, particularly on heroin. As funding was cut over the years the highest level of care has diminished throughout the state, so DDAP also will focus on rebuilding that. DDAP will focus on Vivitrol and Naloxone use in the state, as well as assessment and getting individuals into the proper level of treatment. The prescription monitoring program should go online this summer or possibly in the fall. Commissioner Tennis noted that every other state that has enacted similar legislation has seen a sharp uptick in heroin use, so work has begun on training physicians to properly handle drug-seeking individuals. OMHSAS received \$2.5 million in the proposed budget to expand Vivitrol use for individuals leaving county jails and transitioning to county-based treatment utilizing the county Criminal Justice Advisory Board (CJAB) structure. OMHSAS is also looking to use recovery specialists to handle effective interventions. Commissioner Zottola and Commissioner Ward shared their enthusiasm for Vivitrol use, but noted that it is expensive. Commissioner Marion said the pharmacy folks at the Office of Medical Assistance Programs (OMAP) have identified ways to greatly reduce the cost of the medication. Vivitrol is covered on the physical health side for those on Medicaid. OMHSAS will focus on filling the gap of those folks that are not Medicaid.

Ms. Rosenberg noted that Governor Wolf's budget discusses merging DOC and PBPP. Senator Greenleaf sent out a sponsorship letter to see if there is interest in supporting that. Commissioners Wetzel and Tuttle are establishing a taskforce to develop a blueprint for the merger. PCCD will be represented on that taskforce.

Ms. Rosenberg said the Auditor General notified PCCD that a follow-up audit will be conducted of a previous audit that was completed between 2011 and 2013. The findings of that audit showed that only 0.007% of \$700 million in funding were unsupported. Derin Myers said the Deputy Sheriff and Constables portion of that audit was routine and facilitated every three years. The audit of the Victims'

Service program was not routine at the time, but was the start of the state delving into performance-type audits. The audit resulted in one finding and six recommendations were issued. Mr. Myers said the entrance interview was held the day before the Commission meeting and PCCD provided the Auditor General's Office with a substantial amount of information in response to their request. The review is anticipated to be done by the fall of this year. Commissioner Ryan requested that a copy of the audit be made available to the Commission upon its completion.

Ms. Rosenberg said the annual CJAB Conference will be held March 25-26 as a joint effort between CJAC and the Mental Health and Justice Advisory Committee (MHJAC). The third annual Statewide Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Meeting will be held the day before the CJAB conference.

The next item on the agenda was the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Committee (JJJPC) Report. Commissioner Anderson provided an overview of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Plan to the Governor which the committee is mandated to provide at least every other year. The plan was recently presented to Governor Wolf's senior staff by Commissioner Anderson and Ms. Rosenberg. Copies of the report were distributed to the Commission. Commissioner Marsico asked why more money should be spent on evidence-based practices when there was actually a reduction in juvenile crime during the time period in which funding for evidence-based practices declined. Commissioner Anderson said it has been proven that these programs can make a difference in the lives of children. Commissioner Mulvey said not only have crime trends changed over time so has the ability of the programs to perform. Pennsylvania is notable for its continued persistence in implementing these programs, and we are just beginning to see some of the beneficial outcomes. There are also an unfortunate number of youth not receiving the benefits of evidence-based programs. Commissioner Turner said there is also a higher percentage of youth identified and prosecuted as adults. Commissioner Heckler asked if any of these numbers were adjusted for demographics. Commissioner Anderson said they are just beginning to look at that issue, and have preliminarily seen that the youth identified as high risk have higher recidivism rates. Commissioner Snyder said the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) rates would speak directly to that issue as they are based on population. Commissioner Snyder added that the number of kids under 18 going to DOC and county jails is actually going down according to DOC data. Commissioner Storm said she saw no recommendations in the report on victims' issues or victim restoration, and asked why there is no recommendation for an increase in VOJO funding. Commissioner Anderson said the issue of VOJO funding did not rise to the top of JJJPC's list of priorities addressed by the plan.

In the first JJJPC action item, the Commission was requested to take action on two initial applications requesting a total of \$180,035, one contract renewal and one contract augmentation requesting a total of \$100,326.89 for a combined total request of \$280,361.89 in federal JJDP Funds. Staff and JJJPC recommended approval of these items. *Commissioner Anderson made a motion to approve the grant applications, contract renewal and augmentation and Commissioner Damiani seconded the motion.*

The Victims' Services Advisory Committee (VSAC) Report was next on the agenda. Commissioner Delaney said one of the principle funding streams for victim services is VOCA which is exclusively funded by fines levelled and collected from federal offenders. For a long time the amount of money in the fund continued to grow but the amount authorized by Congress to be expended, the VOCA cap, did not. Senator Toomey partnered with Senator Schumer to introduce legislation to raise the \$750 million cap to over \$2 billion for the current federal fiscal year. As a result, VSAC worked with Office of Victims Services (OVS) staff and decided on a plan to administer the funds. For the current year VOCA, Rights and Services Act (RASA), and VOJO funding were all increased by 35 percent. Those announcements have already been made. With no knowledge of whether this is a one-time appropriation or the new normal, VSAC must now determine how to move forward. There is legislation pending in Congress to make the annual expenditure out of the VOCA fund equal to the prior three years' average of input into the fund. VSAC would like to embark on a strategic planning process to look at two possibilities: only spending the \$43 million already allocated which would fall in line with the reduction to the cap in the President's budget; or planning for the future with this funding level as the new normal which would fall in line with the pending legislation. Commissioner Anderson will help VSAC in these efforts.

In the first VSAC action item, the Commission was requested to delegate authority to VSAC to engage in a strategic planning process to determine how to spend additional VOCA money going forward.

Commissioner Delaney made a motion to approve the strategic planning process and Commissioner Turner seconded the motion.

Commissioner Onama recommended that VSAC include focus groups as well as a survey to the field in preparation for the strategic planning process. Commissioner Onama also recommended standardization of basic criteria for applications while allowing specific counties to develop additional questions based on their local needs. Commissioner Delaney said both of those suggestions are already being considered. Commissioner Zottola suggested the report on MHJAC's study on the victimization of people with serious mental illness should be considered as part of the strategic planning process. *With no further discussion on the motion, Chairman Zimmer called for a vote. Next on the agenda was the Mental Health and Justice Advisory Committee Report. Commissioner Zottola introduced Dr. Patty Griffin who gave a presentation on the cross-systems mapping work done by the Center of Excellence. A full report will be prepared by the end of the year on the outcomes from all the county mappings. Mr. Merwine said a more detailed presentation will be offered at the CJAB Conference.

Finally, the Research, Evaluation and Data Analysis Advisory Committee (REDAAC) Report was offered. Chairman Zimmer said REDAAC was informed that Dr. Kiminori Nakamura from the University of Maryland will be receiving an additional \$24,996 in state share JAG funding to continue the Residential, Relocation and Recidivism Project in conjunction with DOC. Dr. Nakamura will explore whether the site of residential relocation after release from prison affects the offender’s recidivism rate.

Chairman Zimmer asked if there was any Other Business. Commissioner Anderson thanked Luanne Melia for the great work she did on proofing the JJDP report, and for all the behind the scenes work she does to ensure the Commission can do the work it needs to do.

Chairman Zimmer asked if there was anyone present at the meeting who wanted to make a public comment during the Public Voice portion of the meeting. No one stepped forward to exercise their rights under the Sunshine Law.

The next Commission meeting will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, June 10, 2015 at the PCCD Offices.

Commissioner Rieland made a motion to adjourn which was seconded by Commissioner Turner. The motion carried unanimously and the meeting concluded at 12:37 p.m.
