Chairman Shapiro called the June 10, 2015 meeting of the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) to order at 10:03 a.m. A quorum of members was present. The first order of business was to review the Minutes from the March 11, 2015 Meeting. *Commissioner Darr made a motion to approve the minutes from the March 11, 2015 meeting as submitted. Commissioner Damiani seconded the motion and the minutes were approved by unanimous vote.*

The next item on the agenda was the Chairman's Report. Chairman Shapiro said he is honored to serve as the Chairman of PCCD during this exciting time in the life of the Commission. With new funding and opportunities as well as significant challenges facing the Commission, Chairman Shapiro feels a collective and collaborative effort is needed. Chairman Shapiro also believes it is critically important to elevate the profile of PCCD to ensure that the communities, which benefit from PCCD funding and services, understand the funding streams and the impact made by the dollars.

During his first month, Chairman Shapiro challenged staff to develop a strategic plan within just a few months to outline the core functions and priorities of the Commission which will then be used to guide the efforts of staff, advisory committees, and the Commission. It is important to ensure the programs put in place are as useful and effective as possible. The strategic planning effort is currently underway and will be ready for the Commission's consideration and approval at the September meeting.

Significant new funding is coming into the agency, particularly the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) dollars which will enhance PCCD's ability to help victims in Pennsylvania. The influx of money is accompanied by a responsibility to reflect and be responsible regarding how the dollars are spent, including a re-examination of the current funding formulas.

In terms of his particular motivating interests, Chairman Shapiro believes PCCD should invest in prevention and not just focus on the aftereffects of crime; there needs to be a greater nexus between agencies providing behavioral health services and PCCD's work on the criminal justice side; and finally, that the Commission can provide a forum for the discussion of best practices on important topics in law enforcement, such as the use of Naloxone and police body cameras.

Next on the agenda was the Executive Director's Report. Linda Rosenberg said PCCD had a monitoring visit by the Department of Justice (DOJ) on April 28-29, 2015. The monitors looked at \$4.7 million in federal awards, including the Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) program, the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) grants, and five juvenile justice grants. Grant activities and financial management were reviewed and field visits were made to some grantees. The visit went well and there were no findings.

Ms. Rosenberg offered an update on the JAG program which was unfortunately cut to \$6.5 million for 2015, down from \$7.4 million the previous year. A greater emphasis is being placed on second-year grant awards. Staff is working with the 23 grantees that received funding in the last round of JAG to see if they intend to request continuation funding. If so, staff will ensure that they explain accomplishments and performance outcomes from the first year, and provide a clear approach and a sustainability plan in their continuation applications. Those applications are expected to be ready for the Commission's review and vote at the September meeting.

Next, Ms. Rosenberg noted that the funding announcements for the Endowment Act funds will be released later in June. Ms. Rosenberg also shared that the Lawrence County and Centre County Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) were recently accredited.

In his report, Chairman Shapiro mentioned the importance of partnering with other agencies and the next item on Ms. Rosenberg's report was to highlight a few of the current PCCD partnerships. The first is a housing initiative with the Department of Human Services (DHS) for approximately \$1 million to divert

individuals with mental illness from incarceration and into housing. Another new initiative is the Naloxone and Vivitrol project which is funded at \$2.5 million in Governor Wolf's proposed budget. PCCD and DHS worked collaboratively to develop and release the funding announcement. Applications were due back on June 8 and there were over \$1 million in requests for Naloxone and over \$3 million in requests for Vivitrol. PCCD is also collaborating with the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole (PBPP), the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections (DOC) and the County Chief Adult Probation and Parole Officers Association of Pennsylvania (CCAPPOAP) to develop a strategic plan to implement evidence-based practices in county probation, similar to the work that has already been done in the juvenile system. Additionally, Ms. Rosenberg noted that PCCD received an inquiry from the Sheriff in Philadelphia County to see if PCCD could offer the Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff training in Philadelphia or somewhere else in the southeast. Currently three courses are offered, all in Centre County. PCCD is looking into the financial implications of spreading that training out regionally.

Ms. Rosenberg discussed PCCD's work in reentry. There are currently 17 Reentry Coalitions in Pennsylvania, built in partnership between PCCD and the county Criminal Justice Advisory Boards (CJABs). PCCD received funding from the Council of State Governments (CSG) as part of the Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI) to support seven additional Reentry Coalitions, and one more Reentry Coalition will be funded pending the Commission's approval at this meeting. PCCD is working with the Reentry Coalitions in Allegheny and Philadelphia Counties as well as the U.S. Attorneys' offices in each of those counties. They are on track and demonstrating some successes, particularly in using the strategies they developed with PCCD funding to obtain grants from DOJ and philanthropic organizations.

Ms. Rosenberg updated the Commission on the 2015 CJAB Conference, held March 25-26 at the Days Inn in State College. The conference brought together the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee (CJAC) and the Mental Health and Justice Advisory Committee (MHJAC) to bridge systems and connect criminal justice, behavioral health and treatment. There were over 300 attendees and some had to be turned away so next year's conference will be held at the larger Penn State. The 2015 Judge Linda K. M. Ludgate CJAB Excellence in Leadership Award was presented to Judge Jolene Grubb Kopriva at the conference. The 2015 County Commissioners Association in Pennsylvania (CCAP) Best Practices Award will be presented to Adams County on June 15 in State College.

Ms. Rosenberg offered updates on information technology upgrades PCCD has been working on. The first is the Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff Information System, which was essentially rewritten due to the significant changes made to Act 114. The second upgrade was an expansion to the County Intermediate Punishment (IP) program application, the system used to track outcome information on Drug and Alcohol Restrictive Intermediate Punishment (D&A/RIP) funds as well as County IP funds. PCCD is also developing another application to help Pennsylvania come into compliance with the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Act which now requires each state to monitor all of their police lockups. Currently 1,200 police departments, the jails and the secure detention centers are submitting paper documents to PCCD. The application will automate the entire process and will hopefully be ready within six to seven months.

Finally, Ms. Rosenberg offered an update on the competitive grant applications PCCD has recently submitted. An application was submitted, in partnership with PBPP and DOC, for Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) funds. PCCD, PBPP, and DOC also submitted an application for the Second Chance Act adult reentry demonstration grant in the amount of \$487,000. This award would be used to provide case management wraparound services for individuals with mental illness or co-occurring disorders being released from state or county institutions. PCCD applied for \$1.2 million in National Criminal History Improvement Program (NCHIP) funds in partnership with PSP, the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts (AOPC), the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association (PCPA), the Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence (PCADV), and the Pennsylvania Office of the Victim

Advocate (OVA). These funds will be used to collect and enhance the data submitted to the state police criminal history repository, and in turn forwarded to the FBI. PCCD, in partnership with PSP, PBPP, OVA, CCAPOAP, and PCPA, also applied for a Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act (SORNA) grant for up to \$400,000 to support absconder taskforces, law enforcement training, continuation of OVA outreach and victim notification, overtime for parole board agents, and upgrades to the counties' registration and verification systems. PCCD applied for \$23,000 in John R. Justice Student Loan Repayment Program funds to help support prosecutors and public defenders to offset their student loans. A \$250,000 Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program application was submitted in partnership with DHS Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) to fund a project which would collect data to screen individuals with mental health issues, substance abuse issues, or trauma symptoms in county jails throughout Pennsylvania. Lastly, a Coverdell application was submitted for \$455,000 to support forensic labs across the state.

Next on the agenda was the Mental Health and Justice Advisory Committee Report. Commissioner Zottola said the MHJAC meeting was held on May 12, 2015. The housing initiative applications were discussed and voted on. Commissioner Marion discussed the Medicaid expansion and how it provides opportunities to better help justice-involved individuals with mental health and co-occurring disorders. The Naloxone and Vivitrol projects were discussed and MHJAC is looking forward to the outcomes data from those initiatives. Lisa Gaylor and Kaitlin Miller offered a report on autism, one of MHJAC's identified goals. MHJAC also heard a status update from the Mental Health and Justice Center of Excellence (CoE).

The next item on the agenda was the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Committee (JJDP) Report. Commissioner Snyder filled in for Commissioner Anderson who was in Germany presenting at the German Congress on Crime Prevention. The JJDP meeting was held on May 7, 2015.

Commissioner Snyder noted that during the federal monitoring visit in April the Juvenile Justice System Enhancement Strategy (JJSES) was discussed with the federal representatives who were impressed by the work being done in Pennsylvania.

The Victims' Services Advisory Committee (VSAC) Report was next on the agenda. Commissioner Storm filled in for Commissioner Delaney who was unable to attend the meeting. The VSAC meeting was held on May 5, 2015. Commissioner Storm offered an update on the VOCA allocation which will be slightly more than \$77 million. VSAC is in the process of strategic planning to determine how to best allocate this funding, and Commissioner Anderson is leading those efforts. All county VOCA grantees, District Attorneys (DAs), Chiefs and Probation Officers, as well as all relevant state agencies are being surveyed to identify unserved and under-served populations. Additionally, VSAC is surveying what other states are doing in response to the VOCA increase, as well as monitoring Congress to ascertain if this is a one-time increase or if it will be the new normal.

1. *Chairman Shapiro asked for a motion for the approval of the applications submitted for the 2015/2016 Victims of Juvenile Offenders (VOJO) funding cycle not to exceed \$3,615,171 contingent upon availability of funds in the 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 state fiscal year budgets for a period of 18 months beginning July 1, 2015. Commissioner Tuttle felt that part of PCCD's strategic plan should focus on funding prevention efforts so there are ultimately fewer victims to serve. Ms. Rosenberg clarified that VOCA and VOJO funding formulas are not based on the number of victims served. Commissioner Onama asked if the survey is being administered in collaboration with the victims' services agencies. Lynn Shiner said the victims' services agencies and the DAs will receive different surveys. Commissioner Onama asked if there will be a point when the victims' services agencies and DAs will come together to discuss the results of the surveys. Commissioner Storm said the VOCA Funding Committees (VFCs) would be the best outlet for those discussions. *With no further discussion or public comment on the motion, Chairman Shapiro called for a vote. 2. *Chairman Shapiro asked for a motion for the approval of VOCA program funding for the 2015/16 funding cycle not to exceed \$22,421,218. Commissioner Storm made the motion and Commissioner Kolansky seconded the motion. A listing of the applications can be found attached to the minutes.*

Chairman Shapiro noted that this augmentation represents a 35 percent increase across the board, and that the additional VOCA funds are to be drawn down over a four-year period. Chairman Shapiro acknowledged the efforts of Senator Toomey and Senator Schumer and others who were involved in ensuring these additional dollars flowed to the states. Chairman Shapiro felt it is important for the Commission to dive deeply into each of the programs and line items to determine what is working and the amount of increase or decrease each should receive, rather than automatically awarding across-the-board increases. Commissioner Storm noted that there were stark decreases in victims' services funding over the past several years and when the initial influx of funds came in there was thoughtful dialogue. She added that the increase was passed with the understanding that additional funds will be looked at strategically. *With no further discussion or public comment on the motion, Chairman Shapiro called for a vote. The next item on the agenda was the Children's Advocacy Center Advisory Committee (CACAC) Report. Commissioner Heckler reported that CACAC met on April 23, 2015. The focus of that meeting was to develop Endowment Act funding priorities for the first year's solicitation as well as to determine the amount of funding that should be released so as to not exhaust the available funds. The four areas CACAC agreed to solicit applications under for the first year are: programs or projects assisting the victims of child sexual abuse; CACs; victims service organizations that provide services to children subjected to sexual abuse; and training of persons to treat victims of child sexual abuse. There are three additional areas outlined in the Act which will not be funded this year. Competitive grant solicitations are prepared and will be released later in the week.

The Criminal Justice Advisory Committee Report was next on the agenda. CJAC met on May 13, 2015. Commissioner Damiani said the recent CJAB Conference was a great success and highlighted the collaborative nature of the county CJABs. At the CJAC meeting there was discussion of including reentry folks in the required CJAB membership as part of the minimum operating standards. The Law Enforcement Subcommittee (LES) outlined their six priority areas for the Committee. Some CJAC members have been working on the Strategic Planning Workgroup that Commissioner Bergstrom put together at the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing (PCS). This group meets every six weeks to discuss various parts of the system which have an impact on sentencing. As part of this initiative, the workgroup has toured some facilities, including Lehigh Valley Jail and SCI Camp Hill. A retreat in State College is scheduled for July to look at sentencing guidelines.

Next on the agenda was the Bureau of Training Services Report. Bob Merwine said the Constables' Education and Training Board last met on May 14, 2015. Mr. Merwine noted that there are 1,172 constables and deputy constables currently listed as active and certified. Of these, 921 are also certified to carry a firearm in the performance of their constable duties. The Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff Education and Training Board last met on May 22, 2015. Act 114 of 2014, which went into effect in September 2014, requires certification and re-certification for all of the Commonwealth's 67 sheriffs. Staff and the Board have been diligently working to implement the changes necessary to support the Act. The action item originally intended to be presented to the Commission for consideration will be held for additional review by PCCD's legal department and brought before the Commission at the September meeting instead.

Finally, the Research, Evaluation and Data Analysis Advisory Committee (REDAAC) Report was offered by Commissioner Bergstrom. REDAAC met on May 20, 2015. An overview of Geographical Information Systems (GIS) mapping technology was presented by Jim Frank. The Committee also discussed the continuation of funding for the CJAB Digital Dashboard efforts, which are handled by the Pennsylvania State Data Center. Additionally, a Descriptive Statistician will be housed at PCCD to work with staff on some of these projects. Commissioner Bergstrom also discussed the work of the Criminal Justice Population Projections Committee (CJPPC) which was established in late 1980s as a PCCD-led collaborative effort which also included PCS, DOC, PBPP, and the Governor's Budget Office (GBO). The purpose of the Committee is to reach consensus projections on state prison and parole population for budgeting purposes. Several years ago, PCCD provided grant money to develop simulation modules in each of the three key agencies to project and integrate populations. At this point, each of the agencies has a module that does some work for them, but they have not been fully integrated or implemented. To that end, PCCD has now supplied a \$25,000 grant for a vendor to evaluate the work already done and recommend next steps.

Chairman Shapiro asked if there was any Other Business. Carolyn DeLaurentis discussed the Gift Ban, Governor's Executive Order 2015-01 and how it applies to members of the Commission. The Executive Order was distributed to the members and any questions on interpretation of the Gift Ban under specific circumstances can be directed to Ms. Rosenberg.

The floor was opened for any Closing Commissioner Comments. Commissioner Bergstrom noted that PCS adopted amendments to the current Sentencing Guidelines last week, which will be submitted to the General Assembly soon for a 90-day review. Two amendments are particularly noteworthy. First, the Sentencing Guidelines provisions that address costs, fees and restitution have been updated to provide greater clarity regarding mandatory versus discretionary costs and fees. The second amendment Commissioner Bergstrom called attention to is an enhancement and provisions in the Guidelines in circumstances where there is human trafficking, particularly sexual servitude. Assuming the General Assembly does not reject what has been submitted, these amendments and others will go into effect in

September 2015. Commissioner Marion thanked PCCD staff for their assistance in the Vivitrol and Naloxone projects.

The next Commission meeting will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, September 9, 2015 at the PCCD Offices.
