The SPEPTM and Performance Improvement

The intended use of the SPEPTM is to optimize the effectiveness of reducing recidivism among juvenile offenders. The service could improve its capacity for recidivism reduction by addressing the following recommendations:

- 1. Regarding Quality of Service Delivery:
 - a. Written Protocol:

- i. Identify in the manual which youth are most appropriate to receive the service.
- ii. Document in case notes that the manual is being referenced during service delivery to include topics discussed.
- iii. Review and update the manual at predetermined time frames and date when this occurs.
- b. Staff Training:
 - i. Ensure that the manual outlines the training and requirements to deliver the service.
 - ii. Provide documentation that the specialized trainings have been completed
 - iii. Provide booster trainings on pre-determined timeframes relevant to the service.
 - iv. Ensure that there is a supervisor trained to deliver the service that can also provide supervision.
- c. Staff Supervision:
 - i. Identify staff that can provide appropriate supervision.
 - ii. Ensure that staff delivering the service are provided with supervision at pre-determined timeframes and that written feedback is provided
- iii. Include in the annual performance evaluations specific reference to the quality and fidelity of service delivery.
- d. Organizational Response to Drift:
 - i. Develop a policy and procedure to identify departure from the fidelity and quality of service delivery.
 - ii. Ensure documentation is developed and utilized to verify implementation of policies and procedures.
- iii. Develop an if/then approach to specific corrective action steps to address departure from fidelity and quality of service.
- iv. Develop a procedure to collect data on the fidelity and quality of service delivery.
- v. Develop a process to evaluate and adapt to improve service delivery.
- 2. Regarding Amount of Service:
 - a. Consider ways to increase dosage and duration to match the research targeted amounts of 24 weeks and 40 hours.
 - b. Maintain communication with referral JPO to better match research recommendations for the target amount of service and appropriate length of stay for each youth.
- 3. Regarding Risk Level of Youth Served:
 - a. Continue collaboration with juvenile probation departments to ensure the most appropriate referrals are being received.
