2020 FAQ Sheet on Endowment Act Funding Outcomes

In 2020, a total of 11,326 child victims and adult survivors of child sexual abuse were supported through \$3.5 million in funding awarded through Act 1 of 2013 (Endowment Act) funds.

Out of 11,272 children served:

- 4,440 received a forensic interview at a Child Advocacy Center (CAC).
- 2,695 were referred for a medical examination.
- 1,492 received a medical examination (55% of all referrals; a decrease from 59% in 2019 and an increase from 51% in 2017).
- 2,781 were referred to counseling or therapy.
- 45.7%% of children who completed therapy reported improvement in their Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) symptoms suffered as a result of their victimization.

Endowment Act funding supported 261 trainings (10,853 individuals trained) related to child sexual abuse prevention, awareness, medical services, and mental health therapy. 82.7% of participants found the trainings to be satisfactory.

In collaboration with the Child Maltreatment Solutions Network (CMSN) at Pennsylvania State University, PCCD began a three-year child sexual abuse prevention project in 2018 with the goal of lowering child sexual abuse rates within four geographical areas in Pennsylvania (Bucks, Cambria/Somerset, Chester, and York County). The pilot will roll out three evidence-based practice components:

- Community-based = Stewards of Children,
- School-based = Safe Touches, and
- Parent-based = Smart Parents—Safe & Healthy Kids added to an existing evidence-based parent education program.

Since April 2018, 14,235 second graders in 718 classrooms received Safe Touches. As a result of the Safe Touches implementation, there were 31 known referrals made to Childline. The Stewards of Children prevention program was delivered both in person and virtually to 12,439 participants. In the fall of 2019, the Smart Parents—Safe and Healthy Kids curriculum was rolled out; this module has been delivered to 76 parents.
