Keystone Adolescent Center (KAC) is a non-profit organization that has been providing services to youth and families throughout Mercer County, and surrounding areas, since 1993. The components of the program are to provide Short Term Shelter Care, Long Term Residential Care, Education through local school districts, as well as the Keystone Charter School, Transitional Living programs, foster care, and/or Community Based programs for both delinquent and dependent, male and females, ages 8-21. Due to its community based nature and emphasis on family preservation, KAC also offers constructive behavior modification, therapeutic counseling, and educational opportunities to youth by involving family in the treatment process. They focus on emotional, behavioral, academic, and family problems within the home, school, or in the community. Referrals are accepted from Juvenile Probation, Children and Youth, as well as private organizations. KAC's office is located at 201 Main Street, Greenville, PA 16125.

The focus of this report is Keystone's Community Based Family Intervention Program. The main goal of the program is to reduce recidivism. Other goals include improved family interaction, involvement in pro-social activities, and improved grades and attendance at school. Based upon needs identified through the YLS, a Multi-disciplinary Treatment Plan (MDTP) is created with input from the juvenile probation department. The MDTP goals are developed through a collaborative effort with school districts, county agencies, community organizations and families. The Family Intervention Specialists monitor school attendance and grades, coordinate meetings with the family, and complete activities with youth as part of the service.

Insight Group is another component that utilizes the research-based curriculum book "POSITIVE LIFE CHANGES". The curriculum addresses the four criminogenic risk factors that have the greatest impact upon reducing recidivism, attitudes (thinking/beliefs), personality/behavior, peer relations, and family circumstances. The final components are individual meetings/counseling sessions with the youth and the parent, as well as family sessions conducted by the Family Intervention Specialists. These sessions address barriers and successful ways to accomplish the goals in the MDTP.

Description of Service:

Keystone Adolescent Center is a non-profit organization that has been providing services to youth and families throughout Western Pennsylvania and Northeastern Ohio since 1993. The components of the program are to provide Short Term Shelter Care, Long Term Residential Care, Education through the Keystone Charter School or local school districts, Transitional Living Programs and/or Community Based Programs for both delinquent and dependent youth, male or female, ages 8-21. Due to its' community-based nature and emphasis on family preservation, Keystone Adolescent Center offers constructive behavior modification, therapeutic counseling, and educational opportunities to youth by involving family in the treatment process whenever possible. The focus remains on a youth's emotional, behavioral, academic, and family problems within the home, school, or community.

The Community Based Family Intervention Program located in Sharon, Pennsylvania utilizes a Family Plan, described as a prescription for youth, created with the youth, family, and Intervention Specialist. The Family Plan is developed through use of the YLS provided by Mercer County JPO and goals within the JPO Case Plan are addressed depending on the youth's criminogenic needs by Intervention Specialists. Intervention Specialists monitor attendance, grades, coordinate meetings with the family, and develop a Multi-Disciplinary Treatment Team Plan. The average length in the Community Based Family Intervention Program is approximately six months. Most youth receive the following components: One-on-one counseling, Family Meeting, and Insight Groups. The use of the evidence-based curriculum "Positive Life Changes" integrates discussion among all three components of the service. The workbook and group presentations outline personal strengths, life skills, future goals, connections to community, compassion and empathy, caring about others, and peer interaction. Similarly these topics relate to key domain areas of the YLS: positive peer relations, family circumstances, attitude (thinking and beliefs), personality/behavior, and school truancy.

The intended use of the SPEPTM is to optimize the effectiveness of reducing recidivism among juvenile offenders. Recommendations for performance improvement are included in the service Feedback Report, and these recommendations are the focus of the Performance Improvement Plan, a shared responsibility of the service provider and the juvenile probation department.

The Community Based Family Intervention Program received a 73 for the Basic Score and an 86% Program Optimization Percentage. These Basic Scores represent an increase of 9 percentage point(s) from the initial SPEPTM Assessment. These POP Scores represent an increase of 10 percentage point(s) from the initial SPEPTM Assessment.

a. All youth referred to the Community Based Family Intervention Program will continue to receive the service despite varying risk levels, as directed by Mercer County Juvenile Probation.

b. Continue to collaborate with Mercer County Juvenile Probation in targeting moderate to high risk youth
