
Community Violence in PA

Why is this funding important?

Gun violence, group-related violence, and other forms of violence impact communities across Pennsylvania.

- An estimated 1,906 Pennsylvanians died from gun-related injuries in 2021.
- Gun violence disproportionately impacts people and communities of color.


An overview and historical look at PCCD's VIP funding.

Historical look at PCCD's VIP Funding

VIP funding is administered by PCCD's School Safety and Security Committee and is designed to support effective local intervening and preventative measures to stop gun and group violence in areas experiencing high rates of violent crime within Pennsylvania.

Since 2021, PCCD has supported more than 190 local projects & initiatives, ranging from smaller grassroots programs to large-scale, communitywide and regional partnerships.

• \$150M in VIP funding awarded to date.





VIP Grants have supported a wide range of programs designed to address root causes + impacts of community violence.

Coordinated Community Violence Intervention (CCVI) Pilot Sites

In addition, FY2022 VIP funds also supported the creation of a new pilot program designed to support comprehensive, collaborative anti-violence strategies in focused geographic areas.

An initial cohort of five CCVI pilot sites were awarded earlier this year in the following counties:

- Allegheny County
- Delaware County
- Philadelphia County
- York County

FY 2023-24 VIP Funding Solicitation

\$40 million in state funding for Violence Intervention and Prevention (VIP) has been directed to PCCD for providing grants and technical assistance to address community violence throughout the Commonwealth.

Please note: <u>APPLICANTS MAY ONLY SUBMIT ONE APPLICATION UNDER THIS FUNDING</u> <u>ANNOUNCEMENT.</u> Funding is contingent upon availability and authorization of funds.



CCVI Grant Funding Track



CCVI Strategies that engage multiple systems and community-based partners to conduct comprehensive planning and implementation of evidence-based intervention strategies responsive to 'gaps' and needs within a specific geographic area.

Applicants are eligible to request <u>up to \$3 million in total</u> funding to implement key project activities over a 36-month project period.

CCVI track projects <u>must provide a match of at least 10% match funding in Year 2 and 25% match funding in Year 3</u>. Match funding may be cash, inkind, or a combination of both (see Appendix on page 13).

*Note: PCCD does not anticipate funding more than 2-3 projects as part of this solicitation.



Eligible Applicants & Partnership Requirement

Who is eligible?

- Community-based or nonprofit organizations (501(c)(3) status)
- Institutions of Higher Education
- Municipalities
- **Counties**
- District Attorney's Offices

Applicant must serve as "lead" agency to spearhead the project.

Cross-Sector Partners

- 1. Community (youth-serving organizations, faith-based organizations, other community-based organizations instrumental to preventing or responding to violence within a given service area)
- 2. Health and human services (e.g., hospitals, behavioral health providers, etc.)
- 3. Victim service providers
- 4. Local law enforcement and justice-related stakeholders (district attorney's office, public defender's office, courts, probation/parole, etc.)
- 5. Education (K-12, postsecondary)
- 6. Community and economic development
- 7. Arts, recreation, and public spaces



What do CVI approaches typically involve?

- Trusted, credible messengers and practitioners responsible for delivering intervention strategies;
- Full partnerships with representatives of the affected community/ies who provide input and help shape the intervention's approach;
- A focus on people with the highest risk of violence involvement in the near term;
- Data from multiple sources (e.g., law enforcement, social services, etc.) that are vetted for accuracy and attention to racial, ethnic, economic, and other biases;
- Trauma-informed and trauma-responsive practices focused on the impact of trauma on individuals and the broader population in historically underinvested communities;
- Facilitating partnerships and relationships among a wide range of public, private, and community stakeholders impacted by violence to prevent violence, strengthen community resilience, and build social capital/networks; and
- Driven by a commitment to racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic equity, recognizing the
 various social, demographic, economic, and system/structural factors that drive and
 perpetuate community violence, and bringing resources and responses directly to
 people and places with the greatest need.





Additional Requirements



The lead agency/organization is responsible for ensuring that all grant-related objectives and deliverables are being met throughout the course of the project, including grants management and performance-related requirements (as described in PCCD's Applicant's Manual).



Projects must be sufficiently staffed/supported; this can include dedicating time for existing personnel or recruiting/hiring new positions who will support project-related activities over the life of the initiative.



Work closely with technical assistance and research/evaluation partners identified by PCCD.





Eligible Program Activities & Expenses



Eligible:

- Salaries and benefits for personnel (fulltime or part-time), including overtime;
- Contractors/consultants;
- Facilitating referrals to community-based service providers and programs (including incentives and/or stipends for participants);
- Supplies and equipment;
- Training;
- Travel/transportation expenses; and
- Other activities necessary to meet the needs of programs and participants.



Ineligible:

- Physical security/infrastructure costs (such as security cameras, building modifications, and other "hardening" strategies)
 Construction;
- Land acquisition;
- Lobbying and political contributions;
- Honoraria or bonuses;
- Vehicle purchases; and/or
- Any expenses that fall significantly outside of the scope of the funding announcement.

New Indirect Cost Limit

Indirect costs are limited to 10% of modified total direct costs (MTDC). It will be reduced if this is exceeded.






Navigating the Application Process

Applicant Steps

STEP 1: Review questions and prepare responses within the Proposal Narrative Template, including the relevant budget information.

STEP 2: Compile letters of support or other mechanisms demonstrating commitment of named partners to the proposed project.

STEP 3: Complete Survey Monkey Initial Request Form; when promoted upload proposal narrative, and Letters of Support/Reference.

STEP 4: Subject to availability and authorization of funds, organizations/entities recommended and approved for FY 2023-24 VIP Grants funding will be notified in March 2024.

STEP 5: Approved grantees will be asked to complete an application in Egrants to continue the process toward receiving funding.



The online SurveyMonkey initial request form and required attachments must be submitted to PCCD no later than Thursday, January 18, 2024 by 9 PM (ET).



Frequently Asked Questions

- ✓ I can't open and/or download a document, what should I do? Please reach out to <u>ra-cd-vipgrants@pa.gov</u> for technical issues and overall questions related to the funding announcement.
- ✓ Can current CCVI grant recipients apply for this new round of funding? Current CCVI grantees are eligible to apply for funding under this track; applicants must provide information regarding any prior, current, and/or prospective funding sources so that PCCD can take that information into account when reviewing funding requests. Applicants should carefully review the funding announcement for additional information about requirements and funding priorities under this solicitation.
- ✓ **If I am a current VIP grantee, can I apply under the CCVI strategies track?** Yes. Please note: There are additional requirements and expectations for the CCVI track vs the VIP track. Interested applicants are encouraged to review the funding announcement and Appendix in full before deciding what track to apply under. Interested applicants can only submit <u>one</u> application under this funding announcement.
- ✓ Will my geographic area be taken into consideration? PCCD funded 5 pilot <u>CCVI sites</u> in the 22-23 funding announcement; one in Allegheny County, one in Delaware County, two in Philadelphia County, and one in York County. The service area of the submitted applications will be taken into consideration for funding decisions. PCCD does not anticipate funding more than 2-3 projects under this track.
- ✓ Where can I find more information on CVI work? Prospective CCVI applicants are encouraged to review the Appendix on page 13 of the funding announcement, as well as, review the links referenced throughout the document. Please note there are additional requirements for the CCVI applicants.



Frequently Asked Questions (continued)

- ✓ Is my PCCD grant reimbursement only? PCCD's grants are reimbursement only; however, we realize that larger purchases may create a cash flow issue, especially for smaller organizations. Generally, submitting fiscal reports more frequently to request reimbursement greatly assists in alleviating this issue.*
- ✓ Do we need to get a separate checking account? This is not required but is standard for PCCD. Your organization should still be able to track the funding separately.*
- ✓ **Do my subrecipients need to be registered with the Commonwealth?** No. Only the applicant agency needs to be registered. The payments go to the grantees and the agency is responsible for paying their subrecipients.*



^{*}If your organization is approved, these questions will be relevant to ensure your organization can properly manage a PCCD state grant. A formal Egrants application will be required.





Additional Gun Violence-Related Funding Opportunities

FY 22-23 Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program (SCIP) Local Solicitation

Last month, PCCD announced the availability of \$3.5 million in federal grant funding for local governments to address gun violence and improve responses to behavioral health crises within communities and the justice system.

- Application Due Date: December 20, 2023

The competitive grant program is designed to support projects and programs that address at least one of the three priority areas in PCCD's approved FY2022-23 Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program Funding Plan.

- 1. Improve crisis intervention services and supports across behavioral health, civil legal, and other settings, with a focus on reaching people and communities experiencing gun violence.
- 2. Improve coordination of services and responses to gun violence victimization.
- 3. Address the intersections of domestic violence and intimate partner violence with gun violence.
