- Track record of getting things done.






Community Violence in PA

Why is this funding important?

Gun violence, group-related violence, and other forms of violence impact communities across Pennsylvania.

- An estimated 1,906 Pennsylvanians died from gun-related injuries in 2021.
- Gun violence disproportionately impacts people and communities of color.


An overview and historical look at PCCD's VIP funding.

Historical look at PCCD's VIP Funding

VIP funding is administered by PCCD's School Safety and Security Committee and is designed to support effective local intervening and preventative measures to stop gun and group violence in areas experiencing high rates of violent crime within Pennsylvania.

Since 2021, PCCD has supported more than 190 local projects & initiatives, ranging from smaller grassroots programs to large-scale, communitywide and regional partnerships.

• \$150M in VIP funding awarded to date.





VIP Grants have supported a wide range of programs designed to address root causes + impacts of community violence.

FY 2023-24 VIP Grant Funding Announcement

FY 2023-24 VIP Funding Solicitation

\$40 million in state VIP funding has been directed to PCCD for providing grants and technical assistance to address community violence throughout the Commonwealth.

Please note: <u>APPLICANTS MAY ONLY SUBMIT ONE APPLICATION UNDER THIS FUNDING</u> <u>ANNOUNCEMENT.</u> Funding is contingent upon availability and authorization of funds.



VIP Grant Funding Track



Maximum award amounts for FY 23-24 VIP Grants will be <u>based on applicants' current</u> operating budgets, with no applicant able to request more than 50% of their operating budget, up to \$950,000 total, over an up-to-36-month project period.



^{*} There is no match requirement for projects under the VIP track.

Eligible Applicants & Priority Considerations

Who is eligible?

- Community-based or nonprofit organizations (501(c)(3) status)
- Institutions of Higher Education
- Municipalities
- Counties
- District Attorney's Offices

Who is given priority consideration?

- Applicants seeking funding to support collaborative projects co-designed and co-implemented with multiple partners who are included as proposed sub-recipients.
- Applicants who have not previously received funding from PCCD to support violence prevention/reduction efforts.
- To support continuation of current successful projects whose current VIP Grant awards have ended, or are ending, as of January 31, 2024.
- Proposed initiatives that would take place in ZIP code(s) or municipalities with the highest rates of gun violence, other violent crime, and other need-based factors.



VIP Eligible Program Activities

VIP grants funds must align with eligible activities identified in <u>Section</u> 1306-B(j)(22) of the PA Public School Code (see page 4 of the VIP funding announcement for full list).

Applicants must also identify the specific type(s) of anti-violence strategies that will be supported with grant funding (see page 5 of the VIP funding announcement).

TRANSFORMATION & HEALING



Anti-Violence Strategies

PREVENTION (Medium to Long-term)

Lessening the likelihood violence will occur.

Designed for individuals who have not yet become involved in violence or encountered specific risk factors for violence.

Includes general strategies and programs that target general (universal) populations.

Also known as primary prevention.

INTERVENTION (Short-term)

Reducing risk of violence among individuals who are at increased risk for involvement.

Reducing the escalation of violence among individuals who are already involved in violent behavior.

Also known as secondary prevention.

TRANSFORMATION & HEALING (Long-term)

Addressing both individual and community trauma that violence has caused.

May include shifting towards restorative and transformative approaches that prioritize community strength, healing, and safety opportunities; support and resourcing for all people impacted; practicing and strengthening connection with support systems.

Also known as tertiary prevention.



Eligible Program Activities & Expenses



Eligible:

- Salaries and benefits for personnel (fulltime or part-time), including overtime;
- Contractors/consultants;
- Facilitating referrals to community-based service providers and programs (including incentives and/or stipends for participants);
- Supplies and equipment;
- Training;
- Travel/transportation expenses; and
- Other activities necessary to meet the needs of programs and participants.



Ineligible:

- Physical security/infrastructure costs (such as security cameras, building modifications, and other "hardening" strategies)
 Construction;
- Land acquisition;
- Lobbying and political contributions;
- Honoraria or bonuses;
- Vehicle purchases; and/or
- Any expenses that fall significantly outside of the scope of the funding announcement.

These expenses should only be a portion of the budget and should be appropriately explained and justified.



New Indirect Cost Limit

Indirect costs are limited to 10% of modified total direct costs (MTDC). It will be reduced if this is exceeded.

What direct costs are included under this calculation?



- Salaries & wagesFringe benefits
- Materials & supplies
- Services
- Travel
- Up to the first \$25,000 of each subaward



- EquipmentCapital expenditures
- Charges for rent
- Tuition remission
- Portion of each subaward in excess of \$25,000

Administrative costs that are not clearly justified to be direct project costs within the applicant's proposed budget detail will be considered indirect and will be counted toward the 10% maximum indirect rate.



Application Steps

STEP 1: Review questions and prepare responses within the Proposal Narrative Template, including the relevant budget information.

STEP 2: Compile letters of support or other mechanisms demonstrating commitment of named partners to the proposed project.

STEP 3: Complete Survey Monkey Initial Request Form; when prompted upload proposal narrative, and Letters of Support/Reference.

STEP 4: Subject to availability and authorization of funds, organizations/entities recommended and approved for FY 2023-24 VIP Grants funding will be notified in March 2024.

STEP 5: Approved grantees will be asked to complete an application in Egrants to continue the process toward receiving funding.



The online SurveyMonkey initial request form and required attachments must be submitted to PCCD no later than Thursday, January 18, 2024 by 9 PM (ET).


PA PEACE ALLIANCE

Frequently Asked Questions

- ✓ I can't open and/or download a document, what should I do? Please reach out to <u>ra-cd-vipgrants@pa.gov</u> for technical issues and overall questions related to the funding announcement.
- ✓ Can current VIP grant recipients apply for this new round of funding? Yes, entities that have previously received funding are eligible to apply. One of the priority considerations include the continuation of current successful projects whose current VIP Grant awards have ended, or are ending, as of January 31, 2024.
- ✓ My organization hasn't received state funding before. How do I prepare for a PCCD state grant? Review the PCCD Grant Applicants Readiness Checklist.
- ✓ How come I don't see the open funding announcement in Egrants? Scroll down on this page. The submission to this funding announcement is through the SurveyMonkey platform. However, successful applicants will be required to complete an Egrants application within 45 days.



Frequently Asked Questions (continued)

- ✓ Is my PCCD grant reimbursement only? PCCD's grants are reimbursement only; however, we realize that larger purchases may create a cash flow issue, especially for smaller organizations. Generally, submitting fiscal reports more frequently to request reimbursement greatly assists in alleviating this issue.*
- ✓ Do we need to get a separate checking account? This is not required but is standard for PCCD. Your organization should still be able to track the funding separately.*
- ✓ **Do my subrecipients need to be registered with the Commonwealth?** No. Only the applicant agency needs to be registered. The payments go to the grantees and the agency is responsible for paying their subrecipients.*



^{*}If your organization is approved, these questions will be relevant to ensure your organization can properly manage a PCCD state grant. A formal Egrants application will be required.





Additional Gun Violence-Related Funding Opportunities

FY 22-23 Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program (SCIP) Local Solicitation

Last month, PCCD announced the availability of \$3.5 million in federal grant funding for local governments to address gun violence and improve responses to behavioral health crises within communities and the justice system.

- **Eligible Applicants:** Units of local government (city, county, township, or town)
- Application Due Date: December 20, 2023

The competitive grant program is designed to support projects and programs that address at least one of the three priority areas in PCCD's approved FY2022-23 Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program Funding Plan.

- 1. Improve crisis intervention services and supports across behavioral health, civil legal, and other settings, with a focus on reaching people and communities experiencing gun violence.
- 2. Improve coordination of services and responses to gun violence victimization.
- 3. Address the intersections of domestic violence and intimate partner violence with gun violence.
