



Three-Step Model

Step One: Prior to release, Community Conferencing will provide eligible reentrants with access to family reunification services.

Step Two: Prior to release, a PA CareerLink® career counselor will conduct a needs and career goals assessment class with eligible reentrants. This class runs monthly and consists of 4 modules.

Step Three: Prior to release, women will be able to attend a weekly reentry support group meeting facilitated by Community Conferencing. This group will meet for 1.5 hours per week.

Step 1 Reentry Conference Process

The facilitator guides the group through the following questions:

- 1. What happened?
- 2. How have people been affected?
- 3. How can the harm be repaired and prevented from happening in the future?

All participants can bring a support person (spouse, partner, family, friend). And, when necessary, resource persons (supervisor, department head, faith leader, chaplain, case worker, police officer, mental health worker, parole/probation etc.) can attend a conference.

When people participate in a conference, they create their own set of resolutions for resolving the conflict and preventing it from happening in the future. This process is meant to empower individuals and to restore relationships.

This process teaches that a person's crime does not define who they are as a person and demonstrates them that they have a place in their family and in the wider community.

Step 2 Career Skills Class

- Meets the first two Fridays of each month for a total of four meetings
- Morning Group Session: 9-10:30AM
- Afternoon Individual Session: 1-2:30PM

- "The Paper You"
- Resume Building
- Interview Preparation & Navigating the Job Market with a Record
- Connection to
 Other Resources: ex.
 The Reboot Program, etc.

Step 3 Reentry Support Group

Group meets weekly on Wednesdays from 6-8:30PM.

Group Topics Include:

- Relapse Prevention
- Trauma Histories
- Family Reunification & Conflicts
- Depression, Anxiety, Anger, etc.


What Happens After Release?

Upon Release clients receive a <u>"Comeback Backpack"</u> meant to help them navigate life post-release and maintain dignity during this transition.

Backpacks Contain

- Toiletries
- Sanitary Items
- Snacks
- Walmart Gift Card
- Clothing
- Towel and Washcloth
- Notebook, Pen, Folder, Day Planner
- Literature about Local Resources

Improving Our Programming & Future Directions

PROGRAM IMPROVEMENTS

- Decrease Target to 10-15 women per year
- Mandatory Participation in:
 - 9 session Relapse Prevention and Reentry Course
 - Career Skills Class
 - Weekly Reentry Support Group
- Improved program would provide Free Mental Health Servcices through the PSU Herr Clinic
- Improved Program would connect clients to other local resources depending upon their needs:
 - Case Management
 - Housing
 - Transportation
 - Job Placement
 - Healthcare
 - Provide increased Funding for Barriers to Reentry (rent, childcare, utility bills, etc.)

FUTURE DIRECTION

- Apply for Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA)
 Grant: Second Chance Act Community-Based Reentry
 Program (36 Month)
- Improve Assessment and Limit Participation to:
 - Centre County Residents housed at CCCF
 - Substance Use History
 - o Parent
 - Within 1yr-6months from release
 - Non-violent Offender
 - Willingly Agree to attend all sessions
